CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



Brother Knights,

In this month of September, the Church will celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross on Sunday, September 14th. It is, for us Catholic Christians, truly a celebration and complements Good Friday. On Good Friday, part of the Easter Triduum, we solemnly remember Jesus, the Second Person of the Trinity, in his human nature, enduring his Passion, his suffering and death on the Cross as we prepare for the Easter joy of the Resurrection. The celebration of the Exaltation of the Holy

Cross is a time for us to venerate the Cross again, as we do on Good Friday.

This Feast Day has been observed since before the end of the 7th Century to celebrate three events: the finding of the True Cross by order of Saint Helena, mother of the Emperor Constantine, around 327 A.D.; the dedication of the churches built by Constantine founded on the site of the Holy Sepulchre and Mount Calvary; and the restoration of the True Cross to Jerusalem in 629 after it fell into the hands of the Persians fifteen years earlier.

Why do we celebrate and exalt in the Cross of Christ? It is because when Jesus, in that ultimate act of unconditional love, willingly laid down his life on the Cross, suffering and dying in that most humiliating way, it was for us, for our salvation and redemption, to save us from our sins. In that moment, the Cross ceased to be a symbol of fear, torture, and death and became a symbol of hope, comfort, and the eternal life promised by God for His faithful. When we sign ourselves or bless others with the Sign of the Cross, let us remember, we are not simply going through a motion and as we wear or display crosses or crucifixes, they are not simply ornaments. The Holy Cross is for us as Christians, followers of Christ, a symbol of God's abiding and unconditional love for us and our hope because Jesus conquered sin and death by his Passion on the Cross. Before an important battle, the Emperor Constantine in 312 A.D. would be shown a vision by Jesus in the sky of the Cross with the Greek words, "(ἐν) τούτῳ νίκα" which in Latin would be "In hoc signo vinces", "In this sign, you will conquer." It would lead to Constantine's conversion and the end of the persecution of Christians in the Roman Empire and the eventual establishment of Christianity as the religion of the Empire. So, we glory in the Cross of Christ!

September, in the Church is the month dedicated to Our Lady of Sorrows. The Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows is the day after the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, September 15th. Our Lady stood witness at the foot of the Cross watching her beloved son Jesus suffering and dying for us all. In that moment, we were given by Jesus from the Cross his mother, Mary, to be our mother when he said to Mary, "Woman, behold, your son." and to John, the beloved Apostle, "Behold, your mother."

Let us pray that Our Lady of Sorrows will intercede to Our Lord Jesus Christ for our Church during these challenging times in our Church's history and continue to wrap us all in the mantle of her love and protection. Our Lady of Sorrows, pray for us!

I am very proud to serve the New York State Council as the Administrative State Chairman for Compliance, and I thank our Worthy State Deputy for appointing me to this position. I enjoyed meeting with the District Deputies in July to review our compliance program and the need for a strong team effort to be successful.

When we accept a leadership role in the Knights of Columbus, we are agreeing to fulfill the responsibilities of the position to which we have been elected or appointed. Compliance is a crucial aspect of our responsibilities, and this is achieved in large part by accurate and timely documentation. This facilitates communication of Council activity and leadership, assesses a Council's need, and monitors ongoing compliance.

At this time, Councils should have submitted their forms 185 and 365. All District Deputies must be aware of the September 15th deadline for submission of form 944, the District Deputy Annual Report. This is a firm deadline, and late submissions will not be credited. District Deputies should work to submit these as soon as possible.

The importance of a Council being Safe Environment compliant cannot be stressed enough. As Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly has stated, "Protecting our children is the sacred duty of every Knight." The Grand Knight, Program Director, Family Director, and Community Director must all be Safe Environment trained, with the Family and Community Directors also required to have a background check completed. Please note that the background check includes a state sex offender registry, criminal, and motor vehicle check. There is no credit check. Please be sure to only have names on the 365 that will follow through on the background check for these roles. If a member reported in either of these roles does not want to participate, please resubmit the 365 with someone who will. Our goal to for all Councils to be Safe Environment compliant.

Our Worthy State Deputy has created the compliance team to include a Compliance Coordinator in each Minor Conference. Our team will meet virtually on a regular basis, and can guide and assist all of our Council Officers and District Deputies. We are listed in the State Directory, so please reach out to us with any questions or concerns.

The programs highlighted here are meant to inspire your council to put their faith into action. The goal is for the council to conduct programs that draw men closer to their faith, families, and communities. We will discuss some Community Programs. You need to get your Councils involved in different Community programs. This in turn usually sparks the interest of potential members while keeping your present members engaged. There are two new programs for this year.



- The first Community program is Bright Futures. This is a simple program a council can conduct a school supply event such as backpacks, pencils, pens, paper and donate to local school. The council can also plan and implement a beautification project for a school.
- The second Community program is Celebrating our Catholic Heritage. This program encourages the council and parishes to celebrate the culture and traditions of their community. More details can be found on kofc.org website. Councils should start to plan for Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest. This year's Essay Topic: Is Out of the 267 popes that have led the Catholic Church, who are your three favorite popes and why? This is open to 8th through 12th grade students. We need to keep our children engaged in church.
- Another two great community events are athletic events for youth from 9 to 14 years of age that encourages the values of sportsmanship and healthy competition. The first is a Soccer Challenge, start now to plan for this event. The Free Throw Championship is a few months away, but start the planning, ordering kits, securing dates for a gym in January, and most importantly getting the word out to the Boys & Girls.
- Disaster Preparedness is a necessity today. We do not know when a disaster
 can or will happen. Prepare your family, council members, parish family. You
 can offer first aid, CPR classes, or how to deal with all diverse kinds of
 emergencies. Your council can hold a fundraiser for an AED, to donate it to your
 Parish.
- Coats for Kids program is an excellent way to give back to your community.
 Last year the Knights of Columbus gave out over 286,000 coats. In this Featured
 Program your council would participate in purchasing cases of Coats from
 Knights Gear. Start planning a fundraiser to purchase coats. If your council
 cannot support Coats for Kids, plan a Coat Drive in your parish for gently used
 coats. These programs are just some of the Community Programs, Please

Potential Themes for Cor Sessions Thoughts from Pope Leo XIV

The evangelizing mission

"These are contexts where it is not easy to preach the Gospel and bear witness to its truth, where believers are mocked, opposed, despised, or at best tolerated and pitied. Yet, precisely for this reason, they are the places where our missionary outreach is desperately needed. A lack of faith is often tragically accompanied by the loss of meaning in life, the neglect of mercy, appalling violations of human dignity, the crisis of the family, and so many other wounds that afflict our society".

"Take courage! Without fear! Many times in the Gospel Jesus says: 'Do not be afraid.' We need to be courageous in the witness we give, with the world and above all with life: giving life, serving, sometimes with great sacrifices in order to live out this very mission".

"Evangelization, dear brothers and sisters, is not our attempt to conquer the world but the infinite grace that radiates from lives transformed by the kingdom of God".

"This dimension of our Christian life and mission is close to my heart and is reflected in the words of St. Augustine that I chose for my episcopal service and now for my papal ministry: 'In Illo uno unum.' Christ is our savior and in Him we are one, a family of God, beyond the rich variety of our languages, cultures, and experiences".

The Importance of the K of C Cor Program

In November 2023, I was in my first year as grand knight for St. Augustine's Council 7273, Peru, when an article in the Knights of Columbus' *Columbia* magazine piqued my interest. The article, "At the Heart of Our Mission," described a pilot of a new Supreme Council men's faith-based program, Cor. The magazine piece focused on about two dozen men from St. Mary Magdalen Council 12295 in Brighton, Michigan, taking the bold step of reengaging Catholic men to the Knights' faith roots.

Now, I am a cradle Catholic who attended 12 years of Catholic school, and my parents made sure that the family was at Mass each Sunday. Still, I drifted away from the Church for much of my adult life. In time, I learned that God, not me, was running the show, and I'd better get with the plan. Slowly, through His grace, the desire to build my prayer life and return to the Church had taken a firm hold. In 2019, I put my "faith into action" and joined my local Knights of Columbus council. After reading the *Columbia* article, I realized that the Cor program was an opportunity for our council to reacquaint ourselves to, and deepen, our faith.

The name Cor is taken from the motto of St. John Henry Newman, *Cor ad cor loquitur*, which is Latin for "Heart speaks to heart." Cor exists to form and strengthen Catholic men in faith and virtue as missionary disciples by drawing them into a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ through prayer, formation, and fraternity. What is great about the Cor meetings is that each council can determine how to fulfill the program's guidelines. Meetings, usually held weekly or monthly, cover any faith topic relevant to a particular council. Ideally, the Cor program leader, who can be the council's Faith Director or any member the grand knight appoints to the position, will poll the meeting attendees for potential topics. A good option is to choose timely topics from the Church's Liturgical Calendar. No matter which topics a council chooses for a Cor meeting, it is important to keep the meetings informal to encourage meaningful faith-based conversation. In fact, you'd be surprised by the various directions a meeting can go when in a relaxed atmosphere.

Since January 2024, when Council 7273 began its first Cor meeting, topics have included Lent, Easter, forgiveness, Eucharistic Miracles, an explanation of the Mass, Lectio Divina, Marian Apparitions, and St. Faustina and the Divine Mercy, to name a few. It's important to note that a council seeking to institute Cor must involve the pastor and seek his permission before opening the meeting to the entire parish.

For Council 7273, we were fortunate to have the complete support of our parish priest and the council membership to begin the regular Cor meetings. We have had a priest at most of our meetings, and their intimate knowledge of the faith brings a powerful dynamic to the conversation. The program's three pillars – prayer, formation and fraternity – are met with a beginning and ending prayer (prayer), the topic presentation (formation), and informal conversation (fraternity). My council has averaged between 12 and 22 men at each meeting. The focus should not be on a particular headcount since, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20). Men who have attended the Cor meetings having a safe space to discuss real-world faith issues with like-minded men has reinforced their relationship to the Church. Essentially, the Cor meetings address the challenges of faith retention and spiritual isolation by creating small group settings where men can deepen their relationship with Christ.

Cor meetings are open to all men of the parish, and it is not a prerequisite to be a Knight of Columbus. In fact, the opening of these critical faith conversations can attract men who have, for their own reasons, distanced themselves from the church. According to the U.S. Census Bureau for 2024, there were roughly 53 million Catholic adults nationwide. A Pew Research poll conducted in March 2025 found that only three-in-ten U.S. Catholics (29%) attend Mass weekly or more often. The same poll found that nearly six-in-10 Catholic adults (58%) are ages 50 and older. The data reveals what Catholics who attend the Mass regularly already know. There is an overall decline in U.S. adults attending weekly church services, and the ones that do are older.

The Knights of Columbus are on the front lines with parish pastoral administrators to take risks for social justice, mercy and healing, and evangelization and to bring Jesus to the world. The Cor program can help rebuild the Church by reacquainting – or introducing – men, and their families, to the faith.

The Cor meetings allow men to explore the good, the bad, and the ugly of our Catholic faith. Local Knights of Columbus councils should promote the Cor program because it fosters spiritual growth and strengthens council fraternity and, as a healthy by-product, helps to make Catholic men better husbands, fathers, and community members. The Cor member, by way of example, can then be a potential beacon to guide souls back to the church and the Holy Mass.

Pope urges Knights of Columbus to be signs of hope By Vatican News

Pope Leo XIV has sent a message to the Knights of Columbus as they gathered in Washington in the United States, for the 143rd Supreme Convention. In his video address, the Pope greeted all those present, both in person and virtually, and acknowledged the significance of the gathering taking place during the Jubilee Year of Hope. Then, in quoting Pope Francis, he defined hope as "the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite our not knowing what the future may bring." "Jesus Christ is the source of our hope," continued the Pope, reminding the Knights that every generation of Christians is called to proclaim the Gospel, both in word and in action. He then went on to emphasize the importance of being a sign of hope, especially to those facing hardship. Pope Leo XIV pointed to the example of Blessed Michael McGivney, founder of the Knights of Columbus, who responded to the needs of immigrant Catholics and the poor with practical help and spiritual support. This mission of fraternal charity, he noted, continues through the work of local Knights of Columbus councils around the world. This year's theme, "Heralds of Hope," the Pope said, serves as a reminder of the role Knights are called to play in their parishes, communities, and families. The Pope expressed his gratitude for the Order's efforts in gathering men for prayer, formation, and service, as well as its outreach to vulnerable people, including pregnant women, children, the poor, and those affected by war.

"With these brief words," the Pope concluded, "I offer my good wishes for the work of the Supreme Convention," entrusting their efforts to the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Blessed Michael McGivney. 



God, our Father, protector of the poor and defender of the widow and orphan, you called your priest, **Blessed Michael McGivney**, to be an apostle of Christian family life and to lead the young to the generous service of their neighbor. Through the example of his life and virtue, may we follow your Son, Jesus Christ, more closely, fulfilling his commandment of charity and building up his Body which is the Church. Let the inspiration of your servant prompt us to greater confidence in your love so that we may continue his work of caring for the needy and the outcast. We humbly ask

that you glorify Blessed Michael McGivney on earth according to the design of your holy will.

Through his intersession, grant the favor I now present (here make your request).

Through Christ our Lord. Amen



The Father Michael J. McGivney Guild promotes the cause for sainthood of the founder of the Knights of Columbus, who was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020. Members of the Guild, and anyone devoted to Father McGivney, can play an active role in the cause by praying for his intercession in times of need, especially in cases of serious illness, and reporting to the Guild any favors received.

Membership in the Guild is free and open to anyone who is devoted to Father McGivney and wishes to invoke his intercession and assist in his sainthood cause through prayer. Members receive a quarterly newsletter and are remembered in a weekly Mass offered for their intentions.

Catholic men who wish to live out the vision and mission of Father McGivney are invited to join the Knights of Columbus and become part of a network of charity, unity and fraternity that serves local parishes and communities. Father McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1882 in New Haven, Conn., and died at the age of 38 in 1890. His cause for sainthood was opened in 1997, and his heroic virtue was recognized by the Vatican in March 2008, when he was declared a Venerable Servant of God by Pope Benedict XVI.

On May 26, 2020, Father McGivney took another step toward sainthood when Pope Francis approved the promulgation of a decree recognizing a miracle attributed to his intercession. With the approval of this miracle, he was beatified on Oct. 31, 2020, with the title of Blessed.

Another miracle through his intercession is needed for him to be canonized as a saint.

Those devoted to Father McGivney are encouraged to recite regularly the prayer for his canonization, which is available online and on a special prayer card. You may Report favors through this website or by email or regular mail at the addresses listed below.

To request a third-class relic or to order devotional items, click on the online form link. Print out the form, fill it out and mail it to the Father McGivney Guild.
